I will always be grateful for Stephen's leadership. He's a shining light, an engaging colleague, and a dear friend to us all. Most importantly, he has laid a strong foundation for The Upper Room with lasting results that we all can enjoy. Thanks be to God.

Braille

When the printing company that produces the Braille edition closed temporarily before it could complete the May/June 2020 issue, we made the daily devotional accessible as a digital file for Braille reading devices and as a phone-in audio devotional. Wendi Bolton, our senior coordinator of hospitality and services, called the 450 Braille readers to let them know their options.

Amplifying the Voices of Those Calling for Racial Justice

Beginning with the murder of George Floyd over Memorial Day, the U.S. has been racked with another pandemic, one that has never gone away: systemic racism. To help with the spiritual work of overcoming racism, The Upper Room has provided a platform on our website and social media channels for voices and stories of change.



"The role of the prophet is twofold: one, to speak with power and two, to speak to power. This work on anti-racism does both of those things. The videos, writings, and resources are powerful representations of what grace and justice sound like; and the orators and writers who approach this work do so with a conviction deeply rooted in the gospel. This work is needed." —Rev. Ron Bell, lead pastor at Camphor Memorial UMC, is one of these voices of change.

Other things we have been able to accomplish together because of your support during the pandemic:






